COMMUNION SERVICE

When the "Windrush generation" arrived in the UK in 1948 they found themselves excluded from much of the social and economic life of Britain. Many experienced horrific racial violence and injustice. They exposed depths of prejudice in British culture including - and perhaps especially - in British churches. Part of their response was to regroup around aspects of Caribbean culture including music, worship and community organising. One aspect of that culture was carnival. Carnival is colour and music, but it is also subversion - an enacted rebellion - shouting in the face of authority, saying loud and clear that there is a place where the sun shines and laughter and justice reign. Without denying the reality of pain, injustice and oppression, carnival paints a picture of another possibility.

Today's service is led by sisters and brothers of faith and colour. Like the first disciples of Jesus, huddled in an upper room, looking out at a hostile and hardening culture, we will feel the Wind-rush of God's multi-coloured Spirit as we imagine and enact another world. We will celebrate carnival

With one exception, all the music we use in the service is of black origin. The song When Jesus say yes is written by Michelle Williams (of Destiny's Child fame), Carmen Reece, Al Sherrod Lambert and Harmony Samuels. The song is based on a traditional Nigerian praise song. Fix me, Jesus is a traditional spiritual. Bless the Lord with me is by Bishop TD Jakes, who is pastor of The Potter's House in Dallas, Texas, This Little Light of Mine is a gospel song written for children in the 1920s by Harry Dixon Loes. It was adopted by the African-American Civil Rights Movement in the 1950s.

The sona **Wa wa wa ememino** is in Yoruba, the language of Nigeria. The words translate roughly as Come O Holy Spirit, Come.

The hymn Amazing Grace was written by John Newton. Newton served in the Royal Navy, and then as the captain of slave ships. He became a Christian in 1748 but continued to work and invest in the transatlantic slave trade for 40 years. career as an Analican minister that he became an abolitionist. The hymn for the wine. If you don't have one, Amazing Grace was written in 1779 whilst Newton was still a supporter of slavery. Nevertheless it became a standard in black churches in the 19th Century, and was adopted by Mahalia Jackson as an anthem for the civil rights movement.

The words we use at the peace and the blessing are taken from the sermons and prayers of Dr Martin Luther King Junior. The affirmation Goodness is stronger than evil was written by Archbishop Desmond Tutu.

Communion is about saying thank you. For grace. For forgiveness. For abundance of life. For creation. For each other. When Jesus told his disciples to remember him, he gave them the simplest of symbols: food & drink. In this way he ensured that no particular level of "head" knowledge" was required to take part. Even a baby can understand being fed. All that Jesus asked - and it was a huge ask - was that those who gathered round the table with him should be prepared to walk the path he was going to tread.

At Greenbelt people come from all sorts of churches or no church at all, so here we have no "right" way to do communion. The preparation, consecration and communion are all led by Greenbelters. We will It was only in his mid-60s, after a long consecrate the bread and wine/juice together. Please share a clean cup ask at the bag collection point. It is good when sharing a cup to wipe the rim with a napkin where you have drunk from it. We encourage you to include everybody in the sharing of bread and wine. Even a baby could have a drop of juice on a parent's finger. In some churches
